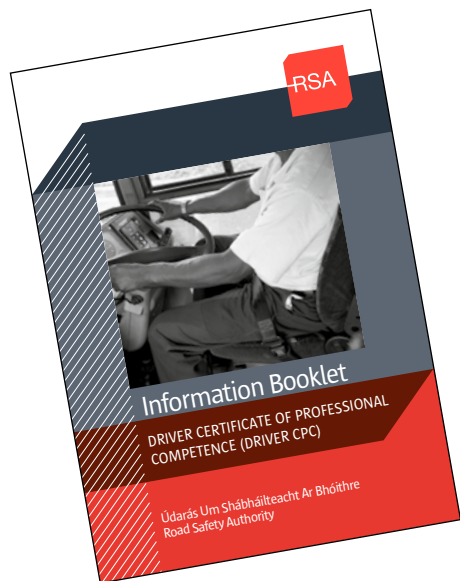

What is Driver CPC?

Driver CPC was introduced across the EU on the 10th of September 2008 for professional bus drivers and 10th of September 2009 for professional truck drivers. Its purpose is to set and maintain high standards of road safety, health and safety and driving among professional drivers (those who drive for a living) of buses and trucks.

Why was Driver CPC introduced across the EU Member States?

- To ensure that all professional drivers have good driving and safety standards and that those standards are maintained throughout the professional driver's career.
- To make sure that training and testing standards are the same for all drivers throughout the EU.
- To reduce fatalities and serious injuries on Irish roads. The aim of the RSA is that Ireland will be one of the best performing countries, with the lowest deaths and injuries in Europe.

How does Driver CPC affect professional drivers?

If you have your bus licence on or before the 9th September 2008, or your truck licence on or before 9th September 2009, you are automatically entitled to Driver CPC. This is called acquired rights. In order to keep your Driver CPC, you must do 35 hours of periodic training over each five year period. You must do 42 hours over each five year period if you have dual qualification Training is on a one day per year basis.

What is Periodic training?

Periodic training is compulsory and will assist drivers in being:

- Better, safer drivers
- Environmentally and Economically aware
- Physically healthier drivers

Training will take place in RSA approved training centres. The list of approved Trainer Providers is available on the RSA website and is updated regularly.

How will Driver CPC affect professional bus drivers, obtaining a first category D license on or after the 10th September 2008 / professional truck drivers, obtaining a first category C licence on or after the 10th September 2009?

- You will have to pass the two tests:
 - > Multiple Choice Theory Test
 - > Case Studies Test
- You will have to pass the Driving and Practical Test
- You will have to complete 35/42 hours of periodic training over over each five year period (one day per year).

How will I prove that I have Driver CPC?

Drivers with acquired rights: Your licence will have an issue date in the relevant category which is proof of your acquired rights. When you complete your periodic training over each five year period, you will be issued with a CPC Driver Qualification Card.

Drivers obtaining a first licence after September 2008/2009: When you have passed the CPC Multiple Choice Theory Test, CPC Case Study Test. driving test and practical test you will complete and submit a Driver CPC Card declaration application form and return this to the CPC Section, RSA and you will be issued with a CPC Driver Qualification Card.

Who is exempt from the Driver CPC?

- A. Drivers of vehicles for non-commercial purposes, e.g. driving as a non-paid volunteer, drivers of emergency or rescue vehicles.
- B. Registered RSA approved Driving Instructors who are giving driving instruction.
- C. Drivers of vehicles used by a driver in the course of his/her work, provided that driving the vehicle is not the driver's principal occupation, e.g. after the 10th September 2009 when trucks are covered by CPC rules, this would apply to a tradesman/woman who uses a light truck to transport his/her materials or a farmer to transport their own cattle.
