Drug/Metabolite	Level in Whole Blood
Δ9 -Tetrahydrocannabinol (Cannabis)	1ng/ml
11-nor-9-carboxy-Δ 9 -tetrahydrocannabinol (Cannabis)	5ng/ml
Cocaine	10ng/ml
Benzoylecgonine (Cocaine)	50ng/ml
6-Acetylmorphine (Heroin)	5ng/ml

- 1. Level must be greater than or equal to levels specified above
- 2. Uncertainty of measurement will be deducted (-30%)
- 3. Maximum permitted time for collection is 3 hours
- 4. Strict liability 1 year disqualification
- 5. No requirement for impairment to be proven- Government Road Safety Strategy Policy of Zero Tolerance






Breath alcohol specimens in Garda Stations 2019


 4,723 successful breath tests (94 % had positive alcohol, 6% had an alcohol level of zero)

Blood & Urine specimens for Drug Testing increasing 2015-2020










Blood and Urine Specimens 2019

- Laboratory alcohol tests 4,812 (35% had positive alcohol and 65% had an alcohol level reported as zero)
- Laboratory drug tests 3,230 (74% positive for at least one drug):
 - Cannabis remains most prevalent with 1,766 of the 3,230 (54%)
 - Cocaine 865 of the 3,230 (27%)


Blood and Urine Specimens 2020

- The number of specimens received in the first six months of 2020 was 2,787 compared with 2,375 the first six months of 2019, an increase of 17%.
- In January and February 2020 there was a significant increase of specimens received: 929 compared to 732 in 2019, an increase of 27%.


Blood and Urine Specimens 2020

- During the 14 weeks of the Covid-19 restrictions from the 27th March to 29th June: 1,367 specimens were received in 2020 compared to 1,262 in the same period for 2019.
- An increase of 6.5% although there was a 70% reduction in traffic for most of that time.


The Restrictions Effect




1st Month of Restrictions: Alcohol Results comparison with same period 2019



1st Month of Restrictions: Alcohol Positive Specimens Gender comparison with same period 2019




Drug Prevalence Screening 2019

Blood and Urine Specimens 2019-2020

- 78% of specimens were forwarded in 2020 to date for drug testing following analysis for alcohol
- increase from 2019 when 67% of specimens were forwarded for toxicology drug testing.

Blood and Urine Specimens 2020

- During month of April during the lockdown period the number of specimens being forwarded for drug screening increased from 70% to 77%.
- The number found to be positive for one or more drugs increased from 74% to 90%.
- Increases were seen in most of the classes of drugs.

Legislative Change Needed

- Graded penalties for increasing levels of alcohol already in place since 1995 (20, 50, 80, 100, 150 mg%)
- Graded penalties for combination (hybrid) of alcohol with other drugs positive (e.g. alcohol 80mg% + cocaine) or multiple drugs positive (e.g. cannabis and benzodiazepines) now needed

Prescribable Medications

- Benzodiazepines
- Opiates
 - Morphine
 - Codeine
 - Methadone
- Cannabis
- Taken as per prescription
- In excess of prescription
- Off prescription ("borrowed" or "street market")

Over the Counter Medications

- Medications containing codeine (and paracetamol*), most frequently purchased-
 - Solpadeine * / Solpadol *
 - Migraleve *
 - Feminex *
 - Uniflu Plus *
 - Nurofen Plus
 - Night Nurse

Plain Messages - Drugs Driving

- Drugs Driving is a major problem in Ireland
- Alcohol remains the single largest DUI problem and those over the limit are well over the limit
- Younger men are the largest DUI group

Plain Messages - Drugs Driving

- Gardaí are successful in detecting DUID at the roadside in increasing numbers
- Need to increase drug testing in drivers particularly in Garda stations but also at roadside - increased detection during Covid-19 restrictions
- ◆ 41 additional PDT devices released by MBRS to Gardaí for roadside testing for August Bank Holiday 2020 campaign (now: 83 + 41 = 124 versus 75 in 2019)

Plain Messages – Prescribable and Over the Counter Drugs

- Prescribable and OTC drugs are also a real problem and mirror taking of drugs and medications in Ireland
- Need to watch benzodiazepines, Z-drugs and pregabalin
- Take your on medications, be safe on them, read the patient information leaflet and listen to your doctor's and pharmacist's advice
- Drive safely, be aware of your own impairment and don't kill or maim others or yourself or risk losing your licence to drive
